## Comprehension (19 marks)

Read this passage very carefully and then answer the questions that follow.  
Remember to answer in full sentences.

1. Read lines 1 - 8 again. What do these lines suggest about Ben and Michael's personalities?

2. In lines 7 - 8 the author writes, '*Reluctantly, Ben followed.*' What does the word '*reluctantly*' tell us about how Ben was feeling about taking a shortcut?

3. Read lines 9 - 17 again. What noises are described in this passage? Give **three** different noises that are described.

4. When the author says, '*A thick, tangled creeper seemed to suffocate the damp, crumbling walls*' (line 15), what do you think she means?

5. What clue suggested to the boys that someone was inside the building?

6. Find and copy **one** sentence from the text that suggests that Ben is feeling scared.

Before you start writing, think about:

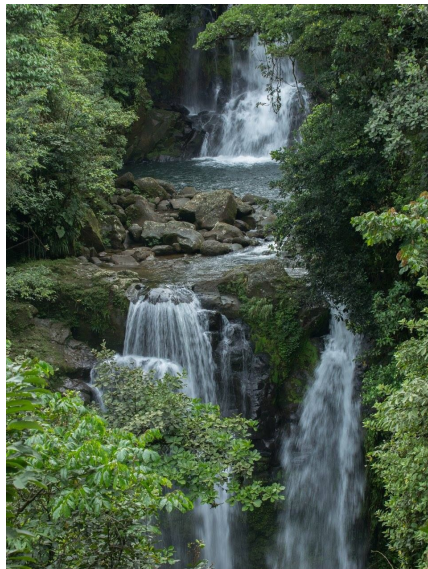
- What Ben and Michael have seen. Remember to think about how you will describe what they are looking at.

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## 8 + Entrance Examination - English Paper 2 - English Mark Scheme

### Comprehension (19 marks)

In all answers, deduct half a mark for answers that aren't written in full or punctuated sentences.

1. These lines suggest that Ben has an anxious/scared personality (1 mark), Michael has a brave/rude/adventurous personality (1 mark).
2. The word 'reluctantly' tells us that Ben does not want to/isn't happy to/isn't keen on taking the shortcut. (1 mark)
3. The noises that are described are the creaking lamp (1 mark), the screeching birds (1 mark) and Michael's breathing (1 mark).
4. Award 1 mark for any description of the creeper covering/ hiding/ taking over the walls.
5. The clue that suggested that someone was in the house was the trail of smoke coming from the chimney (1 mark).
6. Award 1 mark for any one of the following:
  - "What if we get stuck in the mud?" asked Ben, nibbling his lip anxiously.
  - Ben could hear his brother's rapid breathing beside him and feel his own heart thumping against his chest.
  - Ben followed Michael's horrified gaze and what he saw made his stomach lurch.
  - Reluctantly, Ben followed.
  - "Let's go," said Ben, tugging at Michael's sleeve.

8. Four examples of specific words or phrases with valid explanation of how they make the place seem mysterious and scary. Examples:

- The author says that the windows 'glinted menacingly' which makes the house seem angry and scary.
- The author writes that Ben sees movement behind the windows. This makes the reader think that someone is watching them from the house.
- The author says that the lamp is swinging even though the air is still. This suggests that the house might be haunted or that someone might be in the house.
- The author writes that the birds won't go near the house. This suggests that the birds know there is something dangerous about the house.

### Composition (24 marks)

<b>Structure (4 marks)</b>	
Is there a clear beginning, middle and end? (Note: task 1 should include just a middle and end)	
Has an attempt been made to add a problem or dilemma into the story?	
Has an attempt been made to resolve the problem at the end of the story?	
Has clear paragraphing been used?	
<b>Vocabulary (4 marks)</b>	
Have a variety of adjectives and/or adverbs been used to add detail?	
Have a variety of sentence openers been used? ("First", "then", "next", "finally", "eventually", "suddenly" etc.)	
Have a variety of conjunctions been used to link ideas? ("So", "because", "and", "even though", "although", "besides" etc.)	
Does the story include evidence of alliteration, similes or metaphors?	
<b>Content (5 marks)</b>	
Is the content relevant to the topic?	
Is the plot coherent, with ideas clearly explained?	
Have characters been described through dialogue, narration and action?	
Has the setting been described in detail, perhaps by using senses? (what the	

scene looks like, sounds like etc.)	
Is the content imaginative and creative?	
<b>Punctuation (4 marks)</b>	
Are full stops and capital letters (including proper nouns) used consistently and correctly?	
Has speech been punctuated correctly?	
Have apostrophes been used consistently and correctly?	
Have exclamation marks, commas or questions marks been included?	
<b>Grammar (2 marks)</b>	
Has a consistent tense been used throughout the text?	
Does the choice of words make sense and are sentences written in the correct order?	
<b>Spelling (2 marks)</b>	
Are common words spelled correctly?	
Has an attempt been made to spell tricky words phonetically?	
<b>Presentation (3 marks)</b>	
Is writing legible and neat?	
Is writing consistently joined correctly?
